An act to amend Section 12072.5 of the Penal Code, relating to firearms.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 669, as amended, Hertzberg. Firearms: ballistics identification systems study.

Existing law requires the Attorney General to conduct a study to evaluate ballistics identification systems, as defined, to determine the feasibility and potential benefits to law enforcement of utilizing a statewide ballistics identification system capable of maintaining a data base of ballistic images and information from test fired and sold firearms, as specified. Under existing law, the Attorney General is required to submit a report to the Legislature with the results of the study no later than June 1, 2001.

This bill would extend the date by which the Attorney General's report is due to the Legislature to ~~June 1~~ January 31, 2002.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 12072.5 of the Penal Code is amended
2 to read:

1 12072.5. (a) For purposes of this section, “ballistics
2 identification systems” includes, but is not limited to, any
3 automated image analysis system that is capable of storing firearm
4 ballistic markings and tracing those markings to the firearm that
5 produced them.

6 (b) The Attorney General shall conduct a study to evaluate
7 ballistics identification systems to determine the feasibility and
8 potential benefits to law enforcement of utilizing a statewide
9 ballistics identification system capable of maintaining a data base
10 of ballistic images and information from test fired and sold
11 firearms. The study shall include an evaluation of ballistics
12 identification systems currently used by state and federal law
13 enforcement agencies and the firearms industry. The Attorney
14 General shall consult with law enforcement agencies, firearms
15 industry representatives, private technology providers, and other
16 appropriate parties in conducting the study.

17 (c) In evaluating ballistics identification systems to determine
18 the feasibility of utilizing a statewide system as required pursuant
19 to subdivision (b), the Attorney General shall consider, at a
20 minimum, the following:

21 (1) The development of methods by which firearm
22 manufacturers, importers, and dealers may potentially capture
23 ballistic images from firearms prior to sale in California and
24 forward that information to the Attorney General.

25 (2) The development of methods by which the Attorney
26 General will receive, store, and make available to law enforcement
27 ballistic images submitted by firearm manufacturers, importers,
28 and dealers prior to sale in California.

29 (3) The potential financial costs to the Attorney General of
30 implementing and operating a statewide ballistics identification
31 system, including the process for receipt of information from
32 firearm manufacturers, importers, and dealers.

33 (4) The capability of a ballistics identification system
34 maintaining a data base of ballistic images and information from
35 test fired firearms for all firearms sold in California.

36 (5) The compatibility of a ballistics identification system with
37 ballistics identification systems that are currently used by law
38 enforcement agencies in California.

39 (6) A method to ensure that state and local law enforcement
40 agencies can forward ballistic identification information to the

1 Attorney General for inclusion in a statewide ballistics
2 identification system.

3 (7) The feasibility and potential benefits to law enforcement of
4 requiring firearm manufacturers, importers, and dealers to provide
5 the Attorney General with ballistic images from any, or a selected
6 number of, test fired firearms prior to the sale of those firearms in
7 California.

8 (d) The Attorney General shall submit a report to the
9 Legislature with the results of the study not later than ~~June 1~~
10 *January 31*, 2002. In the event the report includes a determination
11 that a ballistics identification system and data base is feasible and
12 would benefit law enforcement, the report shall also recommend
13 a strategy for implementation.
