An act to amend Section 830.1 of the Penal Code, relating to ~~peace officers~~: *public safety, and making an appropriation therefor.*

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1872, as amended, Gray. Peace officers: deputy sheriffs.

Existing law establishes categories of peace officers with varying powers and authority to make arrests and carry firearms. Under existing law, in certain counties, a deputy sheriff, who is employed to perform duties exclusively or initially relating to custodial assignments with responsibilities for maintaining the operations of county custodial facilities, is a peace officer whose authority extends to any place in the state only while engaged in the performance of the duties of his or her employment and for the purpose of carrying out the primary function of employment relating to his or her custodial assignments, or when performing other law enforcement duties directed by his or her employing agency during a local state of emergency.

This bill would include deputy sheriffs in the County of Merced within that definition of peace officers, as specified.

Under existing law, the University of California is established, under the administration of the Regents of the University of California, as one of the segments of public postsecondary education in this state. The University of California provides instruction to students at campuses in Berkeley, Davis, Irvine, Los Angeles, Merced, Riverside, San Diego, San Francisco, Santa Barbara, and Santa Cruz.

This bill would appropriate \$1,315,000 from the General Fund to the Regents of the University of California, for allocation to the University of California, Merced, for various public safety purposes.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 830.1 of the Penal Code is amended to
2 read:

3 830.1. (a) Any sheriff, undersheriff, or deputy sheriff,
4 employed in that capacity, of a county, any chief of police of a
5 city or chief, director, or chief executive officer of a consolidated
6 municipal public safety agency that performs police functions, any
7 police officer, employed in that capacity and appointed by the
8 chief of police or chief, director, or chief executive of a public
9 safety agency, of a city, any chief of police, or police officer of a
10 district, including police officers of the San Diego Unified Port
11 District Harbor Police, authorized by statute to maintain a police
12 department, any marshal or deputy marshal of a superior court or
13 county, any port warden or port police officer of the Harbor
14 Department of the City of Los Angeles, or any inspector or
15 investigator employed in that capacity in the office of a district
16 attorney, is a peace officer. The authority of these peace officers
17 extends to any place in the state, as follows:

18 (1) As to any public offense committed or which there is
19 probable cause to believe has been committed within the political
20 subdivision that employs the peace officer or in which the peace
21 officer serves.

22 (2) Where the peace officer has the prior consent of the chief
23 of police or chief, director, or chief executive officer of a
24 consolidated municipal public safety agency, or person authorized
25 by him or her to give consent, if the place is within a city, or of
26 the sheriff, or person authorized by him or her to give consent, if
27 the place is within a county.

28 (3) As to any public offense committed or which there is
29 probable cause to believe has been committed in the peace officer's
30 presence, and with respect to which there is immediate danger to
31 person or property, or of the escape of the perpetrator of the
32 offense.

1 (b) The Attorney General and special agents and investigators
2 of the Department of Justice are peace officers, and those assistant
3 chiefs, deputy chiefs, chiefs, deputy directors, and division directors
4 designated as peace officers by the Attorney General are peace
5 officers. The authority of these peace officers extends to any place
6 in the state where a public offense has been committed or where
7 there is probable cause to believe one has been committed.

8 (c) Any deputy sheriff of the County of Los Angeles, and any
9 deputy sheriff of the Counties of Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, Glenn,
10 Humboldt, Imperial, Inyo, Kern, Kings, Lake, Lassen, Mariposa,
11 Mendocino, Merced, Plumas, Riverside, San Benito, San Diego,
12 San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Shasta, Siskiyou,
13 Solano, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Trinity, Tulare,
14 Tuolumne, and Yuba who is employed to perform duties
15 exclusively or initially relating to custodial assignments with
16 responsibilities for maintaining the operations of county custodial
17 facilities, including the custody, care, supervision, security,
18 movement, and transportation of inmates, is a peace officer whose
19 authority extends to any place in the state only while engaged in
20 the performance of the duties of his or her respective employment
21 and for the purpose of carrying out the primary function of
22 employment relating to his or her custodial assignments, or when
23 performing other law enforcement duties directed by his or her
24 employing agency during a local state of emergency.

25 *SEC. 2. The sum of one million three hundred and fifteen*
26 *thousand dollars (\$1,315,000) is hereby appropriated from the*
27 *General Fund to the Regents of the University of California, for*
28 *allocation to the University of California, Merced, for all of the*
29 *following public safety purposes:*

30 (a) *Forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) for two mobile traffic*
31 *message boards.*

32 (b) *Three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for two fire area of refuge*
33 *consoles.*

34 (c) *Eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000) for fire extinguisher*
35 *training equipment.*

36 (d) *Twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000) for three fixed*
37 *license plate recognition (LPR) camera systems.*

38 (e) *One hundred forty thousand dollars (\$140,000) for 40*
39 *EvacuChairs.*

- 1 (f) *Fifty-two thousand dollars (\$52,000) for 40 automated*
2 *external defibrillators with training equipment.*
- 3 (g) *Four hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$420,000) for a*
4 *mobile incident management vehicle and equipment.*
- 5 (h) *One hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) for a mobile*
6 *use of force options system.*
- 7 (i) *Thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for six mobile computers*
8 *with service.*
- 9 (j) *Forty-two thousand dollars (\$42,000) for six in-car video*
10 *systems.*
- 11 (k) *Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for two vehicle-mounted*
12 *LPR camera systems.*
- 13 (l) *Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for one Cellebrite system.*
- 14 (m) *Seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) for one crime scene*
15 *mapping system.*
- 16 (n) *Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) for three portable wireless*
17 *camera systems.*
- 18 (o) *Thirty-six thousand dollars (\$36,000) for 360 crowd control*
19 *barriers.*
- 20 (p) *Two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for safety*
21 *improvement to an energy dissipator on Fairfield Canal.*

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
