An act to add Chapter 8.2 (commencing with Section 25720) to Division 15 of the Public Resources Code, relating to fuel resources.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2076, as amended, Shelley. State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission: fuel supply.

Existing law requires the State Energy Resources and Conservation and Development Commission to develop contingency plans to deal with possible shortages of electrical energy or fuel supplies to protect public health, safety, and welfare.

This bill would require the commission to examine the feasibility of operating a strategic gasoline fuel reserve and to examine and recommend an appropriate level of reserves. Upon a finding by If the commission finds that it would be

feasible to operate such a reserve, the bill would require the commission to report this finding to the Legislature authority specific statutory and funding establishment of a reserve. The bill would also require the commission to develop and adopt recommendations on a California Strategy to Reduce Petroleum Dependence.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 8.2 (commencing with Section 1 25720) is added to Division 15 of the Public Resources 3 Code, to read:

Chapter 8.2. Strategic Fuel Reserve

25720. (a) By July 1, 2001, the commission shall examine the feasibility, including possible costs and benefits to consumers and impacts on -gasoline fuel prices 10 for the general public, of operating a strategic gasoline 11 fuel reserve to insulate California consumers 12 businesses from substantial short-term price increases arising from refinery outages and other similar supply 14 interruptions. In evaluating the potential operation of a 15 strategic — gasoline fuel reserve, the commission shall 16 consult with other state agencies, including, but not 17 limited to, the State Air Resources Board.

- (b) The commission shall examine and recommend an 19 appropriate level of reserves of gasoline fuel, but in no 20 event may the reserve be less than the amount of refined 21 gasoline fuel that the commission estimates could be produced by the largest California refiner over a two 23 week period. making In this examination 24 recommendation, the commission shall take into account 25 all of the following:
- (1) Inventories of California-quality fuels or fuel 27 components reasonably available the California
 - (2) Current and historic levels of inventory of fuels.

(3) The availability and cost of storage of fuels.

- (4) The potential for future supply interruptions, price spikes, and the costs thereof to California consumers and businesses.
- (c) The commission shall evaluate a mechanism to 6 release gasoline fuel from the reserve that permits any customer to contract at any time for the delivery of gasoline fuel from the reserve in exchange for an equal amount of gasoline fuel that meets 10 specifications and is produced from a source outside of 11 California that the customer agrees to deliver back to the 12 reserve within a time period to be established by the commission, but not longer than six weeks.
 - (d) The commission shall evaluate reserve storage space from existing facilities.
 - (e) The commission shall evaluate a reserve operated by independent operator that specializes purchasing and storing gasoline fuel, and is selected through competitive bidding.

- (f) (1) Not later than July 1, 2001, the commission and 22 the State Air Resources Board, in consultation with the 23 other state and local agencies the commission deems 24 necessary, shall develop and adopt recommendations for 25 the Governor and Legislature on a California Strategy to 26 Reduce Petroleum Dependence.
- (2) The strategy shall include a base case forecast by 28 the commission of gasoline, diesel, and petroleum consumption in years 2010 and 2020 based on current best 30 estimates of economic and population growth, petroleum 31 base fuel supply and availability, vehicle efficiency, and 32 utilization fuels and advanced of alternative transportation technologies.
- 34 (3) The strategy shall include recommended 35 statewide goals for reductions in the rate of growth of 36 gasoline and diesel fuel consumption and increased energy efficiency and 37 transportation utilization 38 nonpetroleum based fuels and advanced transportation 39 technologies, including alternative fueled 40 hybrid vehicles, and high fuel efficiency vehicles.

1 (g) The studies required by this section shall be 2 conducted in conjunction with any other studies required 3 by acts enacted during the 2000 portion of the 1999–2000 4 Regular Session dealing with gasoline prices.

25721. The commission shall report its findings and recommendations to the Governor, the Legislature, and the Attorney General by July 1, 2001. If the commission finds that it would be feasible to operate a strategic gas reserve to insulate California consumers and businesses from substantial, short-term price increases arising from refinery outages or other similar supply interruptions, the commission shall report this finding to the Legislature and request specific statutory authority and funding for establishment of a reserve.
