Senate Resolution No. 29—Relative to closing the Digital Divide.

- WHEREAS, California is the national leader in the use of technology for the information age; and
- WHEREAS, Computers and Internet the are revolutionizing the ways people learn, communicate, earn a living, and entertain themselves; and 5
- WHEREAS, The Digital Divide is the term commonly 6 used to describe the gap between those who can afford the computer hardware and software they need to access the Internet at home and those who cannot; and
- 10 WHEREAS. The disparity created by the Digital Divide establishes an impenetrable barrier to not only quality jobs, but also educational opportunities and access to information that all Americans will need in order to be 13 14 successful: and
- WHEREAS, Although there has been a significant and 15 16 steady increase in low-income Americans' ownership and computers the Internet. disparity 17 use of and the continues to expand between low-income and higher 18
- income Americans; and 19
- WHEREAS, Nationwide computer ownership among 20
- 21 households with children is now almost as common as
- cable television subscriptions (42 percent), and Internet
- access almost as common as newspaper subscriptions (26

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percent), and these numbers are higher for California households; and

WHEREAS, Although nationwide more than percent of children in urban households earning more than \$75,000 and 40 percent of two-parent households 6 have Internet access, only 11 percent of black, 12.6 percent of Latino, and 15 percent of female, single-parent households have Internet access; and

WHEREAS, The technology gap is not simply a 10 reflection of choices made by an individual household, but a reflection of a deeper problem of access to 12 infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, A concerted effort is needed to address the 14 children on the wrong side of the Digital Divide in 15 low-income areas; and

WHEREAS, Most parents and children view the 17 Internet as a positive force in children's lives and a powerful tool for learning and communicating; and

WHEREAS, Home-based information technology 20 the fastest growing part of the information superhighway; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, That 23 the Senate of the State of California supports the goal 24 described by United States Secretary of Commerce 25 William Daley at the Digital Divide Summit: "A goal that 26 will close the gap ... may be a goal where we would have a computer in every house like a chicken in every pot and 28 two cars in every garage ..."; and be it further

Resolved, That the State of California should provide 30 support, encouragement, and incentives to close the 31 Digital Divide through universal Internet access; and be 32 it further
